## Potential Projects for Politics Students:

### **The Food Ethics Council**

The Food Ethics Council is an independent think tank and advisory body that helps gov't, businesses and the public make wise decisions that lead to better food and farming. The Food Ethics Council publishes reports and a magazine, organises deliberative workshops and events, and develops tools for ethical decision-making.

### **Peacehaven Community School**

Peacehaven Community School is a mixed comprehensive mainstream school for students in years 7 to 11. The school is committed to inclusion and has a Special Facility for students with Speech and Language difficulties.

### **Refugee and Asylum Seeker Project**

RASP is a befriending project for young refugees and asylum seekers in Brighton and Hove. Part of Brighton and Hove Volunteers, this is a client and volunteer led project involving fortnightly drop-in sessions and monthly outings. The focus is to help young refugee and asylum seekers with integration and involvement in the local community with progression into voluntary placements.

(Please note that these are examples and we cannot guarantee that projects will be recruiting volunteers all year round but we have many more projects with a variety of client groups and communities across Brighton and Hove.)

## **Student Case Study: R.N volunteered with Refugee and Asylum Seeker Project**

***Why did you decide to volunteer?*** I did want to be a befriender for refugee and asylum seekers for a while before joining RASP but I had trouble finding the right organisation. Ever since getting to know people at school who had sought asylum in the UK, I have been passionate about refugee issues and about challenging the way immigration is dealt with by the government and the media. I wanted to take part in befriending in order to try and help make people's experience in the UK more welcoming- especially after becoming aware of the negative attitudes and misconceptions regarding immigration at my school and in wider society.

***Tell us about your specific role:*** Working with young people new to life in the UK, supporting them in group activities during drop-in sessions and outings, helping build confidence, sharing language skills and generally just being a friendly face. I also co-ordinated and helped to deliver a series of computer classes for those looking to learn new skills.

***What do you get out of your volunteering?*** I really enjoy just generally being a part of a friendly, fun group of young people- as well as being able to help out/offer specific support when needed. It's also been nice doing things centred on the Brighton community.

***How does volunteering fit in with your student life?*** RASP is very flexible so if you're ever too busy with University work it's fine to miss a session or two. It's also quite fun and not really like work, so it's never felt like a job I have to fit in.

***Why would you recommend volunteering to other students?*** Because it feels good to help people and because it's fun too and you always learn something.

## Working with University Departments

We are keen to develop our links with university departments so that more of your students can benefit from volunteering and also to explore the possibility of developing mutually beneficial links between community projects and university departments.
